

The report of the Bank Committee was presented to the House of Representatives at Washington, on Monday; but was not read. According to the National Intelligence, two "counter reports" are expected. The same paper says:—

The report of the committee is the report of four members of the seven composing the committee. We have had no opportunity to read a line of it, but we understand that it sets forth sundry acts of the bank, which it considers as misdealing, and some which are supposed to infringe the charter, but is, on the whole, sparing of opinions, or of censure, except so far as facts may be stated in a manner to imply opinions or censure. In the matter of the printers' accounts which have been spoken of so much, and so wantonly, in the newspapers, we understand that one case only is introduced in the report, (that of a New York editor,) and why his case has been made an exception, we are yet to learn.— Mr. McDuffie and Mr. Adams protested against the report, and it is supposed that Mr. Watmough bears them company. And Mr. Johnson, though he assented to the report, to bring it before the house, intimated that it did not contain any matter to justify the sensibility which appeared to be felt by the friends of the bank, and much less to reflect upon the president or other officers of the bank.
