The counter-report then goes on to examine and refute various other positions taken in the Report of the Majority, respecting the transportation of specie. exchange, &c. and declares the opinion that there is no part of the Union which is so much benefitted by the general operations of the Bank as the Southern and Western States. In regard to the comparison drawn by the majority between the condition of the Bank in 1819 and now, the counter report says that the minority "cannot but "regard the comparison thus presented by the re-" port as unfair and partial, and calculated to pro-"duce impressions on the public mind as absolutely "erroneous as they would be positively pernicious." This position is sustained by facts and arguments at considerable length, summering up thus: "Upon the "whole, that the Bank is not only fully able to meet " all its engagements, but is in a state of the highest " prosperity."

The counter report concludes with the following unequivocal expressions: "Upon a review of the whole "ground occupied in the examination they have made, "the Minority are of the opinion that the affairs of the "Bank have been administered by the President and "Directors with very great ability, and with perfect "fidelity to all the obligations to the Stockholders, to "the Government, and to the country. They regard " the Bank as an Institution indispensable to the pre-" servation of a sound currency, and to the financial "operations of the government; and should consider "the refusal of Congress to renew the charter as a " great national calamity. "They will add, in conclusion, that they are equal-"ly decided in the opinion that Congress is called up-" on by the most weighty and urgent considerations " to decide this important question during the present
