

THE CHEROKEES.—We find the following article in the Cherokee Phoenix.

“The General Council of the Cherokee Nation at Red Clay, closed its session on the 31st ult. We had promised our readers the publication of Mr. Chester's communications to the principal Chief, renewing the propositions to the Cherokees to enter into a treaty, but they have not come to hand. The Council made no reply to his communications, more than a notice to the War Department, through the medium of Col. Montgomery, the agent, that a deputation had been appointed, composed of John Ross, Principal chief, and Senators R. Taylor, J. Vann, and S. Baldrige, to proceed to Washington, to attend to the interests of the Cherokees.— This is the second time Mr. Chester has decidedly failed in effecting the measures of the Government. Secretary Cass is now enabled to set down his final failure to negotiate a treaty, shut his book, with the conviction of having mistaken the influence of Mr. Chester, over the Cherokees, when he was appointing him to effect the views of the President. As to the appointment of Gov. Lumpkin, which the Secretary has already intimated, to hold treaties with the Cherokees, we will not condescend to sell a nation to a man who is now about to rob us. The Cherokees will enter into no treaties, at a time when they are proclaimed to be nullity.”
