THE CHEROKEES .- We find the following arti le in the Cherokee Phœnix. "The General Council of the Cherokee Nation t Red Clay, closed its session on the 31st ult. We had promised our readers the publication of Mr. Thester's communications to the principal Chief, enewing the propositions to the Cherokees to enter nto a treaty, but they have not come to hand. The duncil made no reply to his communications, more han a notice to the War Department, through the nedium of Col. Montgomery, the agent, that a doegation had been appointed, composed of John Ross, Principal chief, and Senators R. Taylor, J. Vann, and S. Baldridge, to proceed to Washingon, to attend to the interests of the Cherokees -This is the second time Mr. Chester has decidedly ailed in effecting the measures of the Governnent. Secretary Cass is now enabled to set down nis final failure to negotiate a treaty, shut his book, with the conviction of having mistaken the influence of Mr. Chester, over the Cherokees, when he was appointing him to effect the views of the President. As to the appointment of Gov. Lumpkin, which the Secretary has already intimatad, to hold treaties with the Cherokees, we will not condescend to sell a nation to a man who is now

about to rob us. The Cherokees will enter into no treaties, at a time when they are proclaimed to be

núllity."
