

*Tuesday, November 21.*

Mr. *Strawn* gave notice of his intention to move for a committee to report a bill altering the time of holding the Superior courts in the Flint Circuit.

Mr. *Clayton* of Clark, laid on the table a resolution, for the appointment of an Agent, by joint ballot of both branches of the General Assembly, to proceed to the Territory lately acquired from the Creek Indians, and to take possession of and rent out all reserves and fractions improved or not; and to put the lessees in possession and remove intruders.

Mr. *Clayton* of Clark, from the Judiciary committee, reported a resolution which was agreed to, recommending the appointment by the Governor of a commissioner to attend on the part of this State to the marking of the line between Georgia and Florida.

On motion of Mr. *Daniel* the Senate re-

*Wednesday, November 29.*

On motion of Mr. Coffee, the senate reconsidered so much of their journal of yesterday as relates to the passage of the bill to amend an act entitled an act amendatory of an act passed the 9th day of June, 1825, to dispose of and distribute the lands lately acquired from the Creek nation of Indians. Ordered that the bill lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Sellers, the senate took up the bill to repeal an act passed the 2d December, 1825, entitled an act to create a Board of Public Works, and provide for the commencement of a system of Internal Improvement, which was read the third time and passed.

Mr. Clayton of Clark, from the Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the correspondence of his excellency the governor, with the Cherokee agent on the subject of boundary, reported—that they have had the same under consideration, and are happy to find that all the difficulties which were likely to arise upon the subject, are now amicably settled.

Mr. Clayton, from the same committee, to whom was referred so much of the governor's message as relates to the propriety at this time, of exercising our right of jurisdiction, both civil and criminal, over the territory occupied by the Cherokees, within the chartered limits of Georgia, reported against exercising that right for the present year, which report was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Clayton, from the same committee, reported the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That no further legislation on the subject of distribution of the lately acquired territory is necessary to render more valid, the act of June, 1825—which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate took up the bill to change and define the compensation of secretary of state, treasurer, surveyor general, and comptroller general, and to give each a permanent salary; which was read the third time and passed, yeas 31, nays 21.

*Thursday, November 30.*

Mr. Clayton of Clark, from the committee to whom was referred the proposition of Mr. Thompson Shepard, reported, that as there was another proposition for the same property, they recommended that the governor appoint some person to rent the property at the Springs to the highest bidder.
