Mr. Clayton, in the protest, alleges, that, as he had voted for Gen. Jackson "on a former occasion," it would be improper to repeat the pledge. He ought also to recollect that, as in 1824, he voted against Jackson's even being the second choice of Georgia, per et contra are balanced; so that he may now consider himself at perfect liberty to open a new set of books and choose a fresh correspondent, a privilege of which all the old Crawford leaders will probably avail themselves.—ib.
