A Public Dinner was lately given to Judge Clayton of Georgia, by from 12 to 1500 citizens, at Laurens C. H. (S. C.) The Judge being toasted, made a Speech about the Tariff, at the close of which he said.

"You will naturally inquire, what is to be done? Submit? Certainly not! No freeman will submit to it! I advise, then, the most peaceful remedy, and strange as to some it may seem, I advise NULLIFI-CATION!" He then went on to shew the efficacy and peacableness of this remedy—in the instances of Georgia Nullification, viz., the cases of Chisolm, Tassels, and the Missionaries. But we are debarred of space to run over his grounds. He concluded with the following toast:

The late Tariff Act.—It is now a plain case—LI-BERTY or SUBMISSION! He that dallies is a dastard—he that doubts is damned!
