

*John Forsyth and James M. Wayne.*—These distinguished gentlemen, the first our Senator, the second our Representative, in Congress, have been treated with the most marked contempt by the disorganizers, who are now attempting to disseminate the poison of Nullification in Georgia, and to bring about a coalition between the sober people of the State and the Nullifiers of South Carolina. The Oglethorpe resolutions calling together the late meeting at Lexington, and the little meeting at Macon for the purpose of feeding Judge Clayton, excluded the names of *Forsyth and Wayne* from their invitations. The question naturally arises; *Why were they excluded?* The answer is ready—Because they voted to reduce the 'Tariff' duties, of which these men so much complain—because they faithfully, by their votes in Congress, did the very thing these disorganizers profess that they had in view, the reduction of the 'Tariff'. Yes, Forsyth and Wayne did their duty boldly and fearlessly, voting for a reduction of the 'Tariff', at the same

time declaring their decided opposition to the *protective principle*, and that they would never cease their opposition, till the duties should be reduced to the revenue standard. Yet these men are treated as being even unworthy the notice of these dinner-eating and inflammatory politicians. This gives us "a peep behind the curtain"—a clue to the real designs of these men. They are determined not to be satisfied with a peaceable course—with constitutional resistance to the 'Tariff.—Nothing but collision with the Government will suit these Hot-spurs of the dinner table. What will the people of Georgia think of those men, who make so loud a noise about the oppressions of the 'Tariff, and yet absolutely refuse to associate with Forsyth and Wayne, for the very reason

that they had voted for a reduction of the duties of about six or ten millions? Will not the people see that these men have not the good of their country in view! Will they not see that they have some dark design behind the curtain!

Let the people remember that John Forsyth, and James M. Wayne were shut out from the Lexington and Macon dinners, because they voted to take off 6 or 10 millions of their taxes—while Clayton, and Jones, and Berrien, and other Nullifiers, were invited to these meetings, and courted and caressed. We believe that the nullies are determined on disunion, or civil war.—Let the people watch them—They are few in Georgia—but noisy. Let the mark be put upon them.—*Federal Union.*
