As we intimated a short time before the Election, the Troup party generally adhered to their caucus nominated ticket for Congress, most of whom have been elected. Possessing as much numerical strength, and as great a weight of character as their opponents, nothing but a want of concert among themselves prevents that strength and weight from being duly represented.
