ANTI-TARIFF CONVENTION

The delegates to this deeply important and interesting body, assembled in the Representative chamber yesterday afternoon, and at 3 o'clock proceeded to business, by the election of a temporary chairman, when John Moore, esq. of Oglethorpe was elected by eleven votes over Dr. Reese of Jasper. The members then announced their names and then presented their credentials; 61 counties represented, and 125 members present. The election of President then took place—Geo. R. Gilmer 70. Dr. Reese 53. After being conducted to the chair, he made an appropriate and happy address; he returned his thanks to the convention, declared his reliance on its liberality and courtesy—made some patriotic and spirited remarks on the present struggle for justice and right on the one hand, and lawless power and misrule on the other—and the high character of the assemblage, and its importance to the rights, interests, and future welfare of the state and people—invoked a general spirit of harmony and conciliation among the members—strongly enjoined them by the sacred interests they represented the hopes of their constituents, and the vital importance of their deliberations to discard all minor and selfish considerations—all private interests and personal jealousies—looking only to the best means of attaining the great common object of all relief from a burthensome and unjust oppression, he declared his ardent wish for a favorable and happy result from their deliberation. Wm. Y. Hansell, Mansfield Torrance ——— Moseley were elected Secretaries.

Mr. Torrance offered a resolution for the appointment of a committee of 13, to draft suitable views and resolutions for the consideration of the convention. Mr. Spalding moved to amend it by inserting 21, which being accepted by the original mover, Judge Harris moved to lay the resolution on the table: his motion was lost. Mr. Forsyth moved a postponement of the resolution until tomorrow, and on this motion considerable debate occurred between Messrs. Forsyth, Berrien, Cumming, Clayton, Torrance, Gamble and Spalding: after which the motion was negatived, yeas 52, nays 67, and the resolution was then adopted by a large majority.

Col. Rockwell offered a resolution to appoint a committee of three to draft rules and regulations for the government of the convention, which was adopted, and Messrs. Rockwell, Dawson and Allen, were appointed. The convention then adjourned at half past 6 until 3 P. M. on the following day.—*Journal of the Times.*
