

By a gentleman direct from the new counties in this State, where he had been informed on the subject, we learn, that there yet prevails a rebellious spirit among the Indians, who are determined not to surrender the land beyond what is called the new treaty line—That they decline any further negotiation for the land embraced by the old and not by the new treaty—and that the money appropriated by Government for them, is refused to be received. In consequence of these unexpected proceedings, we learn, that Mr. Crowell has, or will immediately proceed to Washington, to make full representation of the case. It is also stated to us, that the Cherokee chief *Ridge*, is in the Creek nation encouraging the views which have been manifested by the Creeks. Mr. Crowell is said to have expressed to the Indians the impropriety of their conduct, and warned them of the consequences. We have heard of no obstacles to emigrants to this, or any part of the new counties, from the Indians.—*Georgia Messenger.*
