

A report is going the rounds, that Judges CLAYTON and DAVIS, two distinguished members of our State Senate, were *opposed* to Gen. Jackson's election, and protested against his nomination for the Presidency by the last legislature. Now we understand from good authority, that these gentlemen are *unfriendly* in the political sense of the term, to the present administration, and *favorable* to Gen. Jackson's pretensions, but that the Resolution putting the General in nomination and which they protested against, was considered by them as a work of supererogation, because the public sentiment in this State was well known, and the General had already been nominated by a Legislature of Georgia. The *language* of the Resolution was also deemed exceptionable.—We will endeavor to obtain documents which will do to those gentlemen and others who voted with them, justice, and prevent further misrepresentation.

The above extract from the Augusta Constitutionalist was in type when we received by the Journal the protest of Judge Clayton, and Mr. Jordan, and the resolution of Mr. Anderson upon which this protest is founded, which are given herewith. Their objections being conclusive, we submit them without comment.
