

We are indebted to the Georgia Journal for the proceedings of the Legislature down to Wednesday evening. Both Houses were formed on Monday. The Governor's message was delivered on Tuesday, which, we regret to say, is too long for this day's publication—some extracts will be found below.

On Tuesday in the House of Representatives Mr. Echols gave notice that he would introduce a bill to reduce the fees of certain public officers; and Mr. Burns gave notice that he would introduce a bill to provide for the payment of grand and petit jurors.

On Wednesday in the House Mr. Adrian gave notice that he would introduce a bill to remove the nuisances from our territory, now in the possession of the Cherokee Indians, viz. turnpikes, bridges, &c. By Mr. Wafford, to repeal the penal code as far as relates to Penitentiary confinement, and by Mr. Bates to grant further indulgence to purchasers of fractions.
