

FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.

WASHINGTON, April 28.

The Report of the Bank Committee was eagerly expected to-day, but expectation was utterly disappointed. No report was made, and no explanation was given as to the object of its delay. It is reported, however, that there was a blow-up in the Committee, at their meeting, this morning. Mr. Clayton insisted upon presenting his Report, containing a partial and incorrect view of the results of the investigation; and Mr. Adams declared that if he did, before the minority of the Committee were ready to present their views, he should feel it his duty strenuously to resist the acceptance of the Report in the House. The dispute arose into an altercation of some warmth, and ended in Mr. Clayton's giving way. It seems that there is a voluminous mass of documents on which the Report of the minority is to be based, and that they cannot be digested in a hurry.

It is now distinctly admitted by some of the most intelligent opponents of the Bank, such as Wayne, and Archer, that the result of the investigation, so far as it has gone, is not discreditable to the administration of the Bank, whatever they may think of the policy of such an institution.
