

*Indian Affairs.*—Our difficulties with the Cherokees appear to thicken every day, and there is but too much reason to believe that the storm will sooner or later burst upon the heads of these misguided people.

On the 24th ult. a law was passed, "making death the penalty for selling any lands in treaty, without the authority of the nation:"—upon which occasion, *Woman-Killer*, who is about eighty years of age, delivered a speech that very much resembles Logan's, and which is just about as authentic; having probably been written by one of those Alabama lawyers who occasionally practise in the Indian Courts, or by some white friend of the "poor Indian," interested in defeating the interest of the State of Georgia.

Besides this, it was resolved to have the series of essays, by a writer who signs himself *William Penn*, and which originally appeared in the *National Intelligencer*, translated into the Cherokee language, and afterwards published in pamphlet form. By the by, we hope, if they are continued, that the author will insert the famous story about the Marshalls, which holds so conspicuous a place in the annals of Pennsylvania.—*Sav. Georgian.*
